WHAT DOES CHRISTMAS MEAN TO YOU?





There are many different ideas about what Christmas means.



For retailers, it's a fantastic opportunity to ratchet up enormous sales. For Christians, each year, we recall and celebrate the fact that God loved us enough to become one of us, and to live amongst us. It all started in a stinking stable. Not a great welcome, but an appropriate one for someone who was to have a particular ministry to the poor, the sick and those on the margins of society. Someone who became a refugee, and who had to flee with his family to live in another land until it was safe to return home. There will be many people around the world doing that this Christmas.



Perhaps Christmas is more a time for reflection than it is for spending. What is it like to be alone in our community? What would it be like to be homeless? What would it be like to be an asylum seeker or a refugee? Do we know anyone that we can reach out to at this time, or how would we respond if someone reached out to us?



Before I went in for ordination training, I spent some time volunteering at a homeless shelter in one of our larger cities. One of my abiding memories was being given a lesson in survival skills by a man, whom I shall call Bill. Bill didn't fit into any of the categories that we usually associate with the



homeless. He wasn't an ex-prisoner or an ex-member of the armed forces, struggling to cope with a less-structured form of life. He hadn't run away from debt, and he wasn't being chased by anyone. He hadn't been abused. He wasn't on drugs, or an alcoholic. He didn't have mental health



problems, and he did have a family, of sorts. He had chosen this way of life. Most of the homeless do not have that choice. So Bill was almost unique in that place, and he had a number of skills to share with me that



you're young. Sleeping rough when you're long past pension age is far from easy, especially if it's minus 4 degrees, and with a good chance of hailstones. Yet Bill also taught me the important lesson of clearing up after

he had developed over 40 years. Sleeping out in the open isn't easy, even if



hailstones. Yet Bill also taught me the important lesson of clearing up after a night sleeping rough, so that others didn't even know you'd been there. I found this consideration for others, who were far better off, by most means of measuring things, very moving. Perhaps this is one important meaning of 'Christmas'- it's about considering others, and then taking it further – and loving them, no matter what.



We all know that everyone needs a little help from time to time and the value of THE FOUR VILLAGES LINK registered charity scheme has clearly demonstrated that over the last year. Our dedicated group of about 40 volunteers has helped around 300 members of the community with transport and a variety of practical tasks. Many of the transport requests are for journeys to local doctors' and dentists' surgeries although we do undertake longer trips to hospitals in Bath, Bristol and Salisbury. We also offer assistance with small practical household tasks and we even have a wheelchair that can be loaned out on a short term basis.

TFVL is one of 45 support schemes in Wiltshire staffed by volunteers and anyone, of any age or ability can make use of the scheme for almost anything, and in this way we can help to improve the quality of life for residents in our community. Whilst the LINK supports and complements local health and social services it is able to operate at a far more personal level and, for your peace of mind, all our volunteers are CRB checked and carry identity badges.

So, if you would like help just call us on 07852 256 939 between 9am – 6pm Monday to Friday and one of our duty coordinators will log your request and find a volunteer to help you. All calls are charged at mobile rates. Responding to requests can be demanding so it helps to receive plenty of notice when being asked to organise assistance, ideally not less than 48 hours in advance.

We are always looking for new volunteers to serve our community helping with our many requests, connecting our clients with appropriate volunteers or serving on our Management Committee. Being a volunteer can give you a new interest as well as making good use of your skills and experience. 





SALISBURY PLAIN TRAINING

December will see a significant reduction in training on the Plain.

1-6 Dec. The Defence Logistic School will run their final exercise TIMBER TRUSS during which large convoys of heavy vehicles will transit most major routes across Salisbury Plain increasing military traffic at tank crossings on the A360, A345 and A338.

2–5 Dec. The Royal School of Artillery's three main courses will complete their final tactical dry training and live firing on Exercise CROSSED CANNONS from which will include 105 Light Gun and 155mm AS90 firing. Noise levels will be kept to the minimum level.

16–19 Dec. Land Warfare Centre Armoured Infantry course will runs exercise BLACK ADDER with a company of Warrior armoured fighting vehicles using Imber and Larkhill range areas.

20 Dec to 6 Jan training levels will drop to a very low level allowing the Imber Range roads to be opened.

With winter approaching drivers are advised to take extra care when approaching tank crossings as there will be mud clearance parties and mechanical sweepers operating.



MAG (Mines Advisory Group) Edington Charity of the Month

- 1. What is MAG? MAG stands for Mines Advisory Group. They're a non-profit organisation that works to save and improve lives by reducing the devastating effects armed violence and remnants of conflict have on communities around the world.
- 2. What is MAG's vision? A safe and secure future for men, women and children affected by armed violence and conflict.
- 3. What is MAG's mission? MAG saves lives and builds futures by working with others to reclaim land contaminated with the debris of conflict, finding ways to reduce the daily risk of death or injury for civilians, and creating safe and secure conditions for development, free from armed violence.
- 4. How does MAG choose where to work? MAG would go into any country, during or after conflict, if it is safe enough to do so and providing we have the funds. We believe that where there are conflicts there are innocent lives suffering, so any country affected by a current or past conflict can be a target for our aid.

They also work with relief agencies and other non-governmental organisations to ensure that areas are safe before they carry out their own life-saving work.

- 5. How many people work for MAG? They have around 2,500 staff worldwide, Training and employment of local staff means that we can put salaries back into communities affected by conflict. They also have more than 100 expatriate staff made up of bomb disposal experts, managers and trainers. At our headquarters in Manchester, UK we have around 60 staff - this structure keeps our administration costs low.
- 6. How is MAG funded? Most of our funds come from institutional donors, international governments, foundations and other charities. This income tends to be restricted to specific programmes and projects.


THE UNIVERSITY OF THE THIRD AGE

U3A members gathered on November 12 for their monthly meeting. Interest groups are an integral part of each U3A branch. This month a member of the French Conversation Group told us how they met to converse in French, each month, with a few lapses into English! It was explained that a

very basic knowledge of French is needed, indeed the group member had hardly used his French since leaving school in 1967, and that help is available in the form of a French Blog complete with English translation. The group is small and currently has spaces for more members.

Members then heard an excellent talk on Mountain Railways by Dennis Cartwright. Slides of some beautiful scenery were shown as we all learnt the difficulties involved in building mountain railways and the associated locomotives.

Different approaches included the use of multiple engines, up to four at the front of a train with a pusher at the back. Funicular railways were used for small loads over short distances, racked tracks were used on side-tracks, large loops of track and zigzags were sometimes used, rail lines were also built to follow rivers and up the sides of mountains. Tunnels were expensive and technically difficult to build and so were initially kept to a minimum, and many people died during the building of some tunnels. These days modern building equipment, including automatic tunnel diggers, enable larger tunnels at the base of mountains to be built. The 36 mile Gotthard base tunnel now being built, opening 2016, is just one such example. During this talk members were transported to USA, Asia, India, England and Europe especially the railways connecting Switzerland with the rest of Europe. Next month we look forward to some Christmas entertainment.

Facing the World Edington Charity of the Month January 2014

Facing the World is a unique UK charity that exists to provide life-changing craniofacial surgery to some of the world's most disadvantaged and vulnerable children. Their multi-disciplinary medical team offer facial reconstructive surgery in the UK for children from the developing world with severe facial disfigurements that cannot be treated in their home countries.

They also provide training for their partner hospitals in order to develop the infrastructure required for more children to receive the treatment they need in their own countries. Whilst the time given by volunteer medical teams is free, the hospital and the travel costs are not. Facing the World receives no statutory funding and is reliant on the generous support of individuals. In 2008, with a grant from the Vocational Training Charitable Trust (VTCT), Facing the World initiated a 5-year programme in Central Vietnam, training local surgeons and nurses in the skills of a craniofacial team.

This year they are further strengthening their partnership with Danang through the placement of a Project Coordinator at the hospital for four months. Every year Facing the World is referred hundreds of cases of children whose condition is serious and often life threatening. They review these cases and seek to find the most effective treatment for each child. Initially they contact local partner organisations to see if the child can be treated in their own country. If there is no option for treatment then plans will be made for the child to come to London.

CAMPAIGN LAUNCH - "WAKE UP WILTSHIRE!"

472 ACRES OF SOLAR FARMS ARE PROPOSED WITHIN 5 MILES OF THE VILLAGE OF SEEND

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE - 7 NOVEMBER 2013

Press were invited to attend a photo-call organised by Wiltshire Protect on the Lye Field in the village of Seend (SN12 6NS) on Saturday 9 November at 10am.

Two "WAKE UP WILTSHIRE!" signs (4ft by 4ft) are to be erected informing people of the Solar farms proposed around the village of Seend.

If Wiltshire is to meet its share of the national target for 30% of electricity generation from renewable sources, the county needs to be generating 367MW from renewables by 2020*. The figure of 367MW can be generated from about 2000 acres of land.

472 ACRES OF SOLAR FARMS ARE PROPOSED within a 5 mile radius of Seend – a picturesque village set in the heart of rural Wiltshire. If developed, these solar farms will generate 91.7 MW of renewable capacity. This means the rural valleys surrounding this village of Seend will be supplying one quarter of the whole county's renewable energy requirements.

Like many in Wiltshire, the residents of Seend are generally in favour of renewable energy but question whether these are the most appropriate locations for industrial scale solar farms to be sited when taking into account the size of the entire county.

We urge people in Wiltshire to oppose the 79 acre greenfield Poulshot Solar Park Proposal before 21 November by writing into the Wiltshire Planning officer.


Coulston Village Christmas Bazaar – Saturday 7th December from 10.30am





The drying and firing of the pots is lengthy and important for the finished process.
