

LOOKING BACK, AND LOOKING FORWARD

At this time of year it is so easy to get caught up in all the preparations for Christmas that we lose the opportunity to reflect on what has happened in the year that has just passed.

The year started with the Ebola outbreak in West Africa, with, at the time of writing, 10 000 people infected and 5 000 deaths. This is an on-going problem for the whole world.

The Russians held Winter Olympics in Sochi, designed to send out a positive message about their country, but which were almost completely overshadowed by events in the Ukraine in February, where the pro-Russian President Yanukovych was removed from office, after civil unrest and a hundred deaths in Kiev. The Crimea was formally annexed by Russia a month later, and tensions with Europe grew significantly. The question of the good government of Donetsk and Luhansk remains. On March the eighth, contact was lost with Malaysian Airlines Flight 370, and the aircraft has still not been found. In April, an estimated two hundred and seventy six women and schoolgirls were abducted and held hostage in Nigeria by Boko Haram: the reported 'bride price' has been quoted as being £7.50. These events are still unresolved. For a few months, the news was less dramatic, unless you lived in Nigeria, where terrorist activity was considerable. In June, the world in general heard its first of 'Islamic State in Iraq and the Levant' as it got uncomfortably-close to Baghdad. In July, following the death of three Israeli and a Palestinian teenager, a ground invasion of the Gaza strip was launched, leading directly or indirectly to the death of 71 Israelis and 2,100 Palestinians. Although troops are now back to their original positions, the reasons for the mistrust continue. August saw the bombing of ISIS/ISIL by the United States, which continues at the time of writing, and protests in Hong Kong were prominent in October. Finally, in November, the month started with the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change reporting on 'severe' and 'irreversible' damage to the climate of the world due to carbon dioxide emissions.

For me, when I look down the list, it isn't the number or variety of major events that makes 2014 difficult to categorise. There have always been years filled with death, disease and destruction: indeed perhaps the most famous thing about 2014 is that it is the centenary of the commencement of World War I. No: for me, the interesting thing is that so many of these events are inconclusive: they are yet to be resolved. We don't know whether Ebola will be controlled; we don't know what will happen in the Ukraine; we don't know whether the tide will be turned against the terrorists, or whether loved ones will be found. In our neat lives, some things are beyond our control—and we have to live with that. As a Christian, this is where the hope present in the Gospels means so much: it enables me to carry on with confidence, knowing that the God who made himself known in the muck of a stable was with us then, and is with us all, forever more.





We all know that everyone needs a little help from time to time and the value of THE FOUR VILLAGES LINK registered charity scheme has clearly demonstrated that. Last month we had over 30 requests for assistance and members of our dedicated group of about 40 volunteers provided transport and helped with a variety of practical tasks. Many of the transport requests are for journeys to local doctors' and dentists' surgeries although we do undertake longer trips to hospitals in Bath, Bristol and Salisbury. We also offer assistance with small practical household tasks and we even have a wheelchair that can be loaned out on a short term basis.





So, if you would like help just call us on 07852-256939 between 9am – 6pm Monday to Friday and one of our duty coordinators will log your request and find a volunteer to help you. All calls are charged at mobile rates. Responding to requests can be demanding so it helps to receive plenty of notice when being asked to organise assistance, ideally not less than 48 hours in advance, particularly during the Christmas period. Please note that the service will be closed on 25th & 26th December and also on New Year's Day.

TFVL is one of 45 support schemes in Wiltshire staffed by volunteers and anyone, of any age or ability can make use of the scheme for almost anything, and in this way we can help to improve the quality of life for residents in our community. Whilst the LINK supports and complements local health and social services it is able to operate at a far more personal level and, for your peace of mind, all our volunteers are CRB checked and carry identity badges.







The November general meeting of U3A heard a very interesting and entertaining talk entitled "A Policeman's Lot". Alan Rogers had travelled from Warwick finding his way around the Westbury Road works. Now retired, he concentrated on events from the lighter side of his 33 year service as a police officer.

Alan joined Warwickshire Police, the smallest force in the country, as a 17 year old cadet on the advice of his father who thought it a more secure career than the alternative on offer, professional football. He did however, play football for the police at county and national level being a member of various teams that beat Wiltshire Police.

After Police College Alan was a fully-fledged PC at age 19 and was assigned to work with an experienced tutor constable. With a great deal of encouragement from his mentor Alan made an arrest on his first day on patrol, a young lad fooling around with pelican crossing lights after a few drinks. The charge used a very obscure law as the offense and Alan and was never allowed to forget about it by his superiors.

Five years later as a Tutor Constable himself Alan used "practical jokes" to teach his pupils. This involved scenario settings with volunteer "dead bodies" that had to be searched in order to identify them, a method of tuition that is no longer considered correct. Later on whilst working in the traffic division he chased and eventually stopped a speeding motorcyclist who was travelling at 136 mph. On removing his helmet the motorcyclist was seen to be an OAP, who explained that at 86 he was having a last blast of speed before handing in his driving licences having sold both his car and motorcycle. Alan also mentioned that he thought he had recognised one or two people in the audience and wondered if he had seen them in the lens of a speed camera from 1 km away!


ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Michelle Whiting and Chris Thompson – put together a vivid and compelling story in words and music of the first five months of the War. Over seventy people of all ages filled the candle-lit church to hear about the Coulston servicemen who died between 1914 and 1918. Readings and poems covered not just the events of the war but activity on the Home Front, as well as details of the famous

"Christmas Truce" as recorded by Capt Sir Edward Hulse in letters to his parents in Salisbury. The musical interludes linking the readings included hymns, folk songs, a haunting piano and cello duet, and culminated in the traditional Last Post and Reveille.

After the commemoration in church the congregation was invited to adjourn to the village hall for a finger buffet organised by Rosie Grier. A wonderful selection of canapés, sandwiches and cakes was laid out alongside the detailed histories of the Coulston servicemen. This was supplemented by information about relatives of villagers who had been killed in the First World War.

Heartfelt congratulations to Mel and all her team for organising such a remarkable occasion, and to Helen's mother for identifying two previously unknown servicemen with strong links to Coulston. The evening was enjoyed hugely by everyone. To crown it all, the retiring collection raised an amazing £220 for the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal – a truly fantastic result!

An amazing £180 was collected and will be split between the Parish Hall and Under Fives group.



Fortunately, Bratton Primary School has an excellent team of dedicated and capable staff who work tirelessly to support the children in our school.

We have had so much fun over the years with plays, sports events, trips to outdoor centres, visits to Bratton Orchard, dancing at village fetes and dance festivals, going to Twickenham to play Rugby, singing for the Lions Concerts in Westbury, street parties and Carol Concerts in Edington and Harvest in the Chapel. Not to mention the removal of Asbestos from the school, rewiring, new boilers, a new roof and new windows to name but a few improvements over the years.

It has been an absolute pleasure, and an honour, to have been the Headteacher here from January 2006 until December 2014. It has been an excellent way to end my teaching career and, although I will remember all of the schools in which I have taught, I will have particularly fond memories of being the Headteacher at Bratton Primary School. As I leave the school I truly believe that it is in better shape now, both structurally and academically, and so I can know that in some way I have made a difference. Thank you to






Our skittles team is doing well too with two out of two wins so fingers crossed for our next match ladies.



EDINGTON & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB FIRST THURSDAY IN THE MONTH PARISH HALL 7.30PM

A new name but the same enthusiasm for all things gardening!

At the start of the November meeting, members voted to include '& District' to our name. We hope others might also join us from around the area.

Our speaker Mike Burgess from Hilmarten gave a very comprehensive talk on 'finding room for fruit' in the garden. With the help of slides and his comprehensive knowledge, he explained how not only gardeners wish to have smaller fruit trees in their gardens, so do the professionals. Orchards are easier for maintenance - pruning, spraying and picking if the trees are from a dwarf root stock compared to the huge trees from the past.


To make the most of the area available try any of the following: an oblique corden - a single stem at 45° at 2'apart, a double U corden, an espalier along a pathside, a fan against a wall, or an upright corden 7'. All plants must be planted with the joint of the root stock at least six inches above the ground. In general pruning is done for training and shapes in August — cut above the 3rd leaf above the basal cluster on the main branch and above the 1st leaf above the basal cluster on a side stem. Winter pruning promotes growth. Lead shoots to keep the desired height are pruned in May.

Plums cherries and even gooseberries and currants, although not blackcurrants, can also be trained. Strawberries can be put in pots and tubs. There are many small varieties of soft fruits, even a 12" apricot!

December is our Christmas Social (check you have booked your ticket) February 5th brings Richard Cripps talking on 'Basics of vegetable growing' do come along and join us.

We have no meeting in January.
