

MAKING CONNECTIONS

I am writing this article in Tallinn, the capital city of Estonia, although I will have been back in the UK for a few weeks by the time you get to read this. Tallinn is located due south of Finland and a group of people from our local villages have been involved in officially handing over the Henry Jones Organ, from Edington Priory Church, to a school here.

I knew from within a few seconds of landing at Tallinn's airport that this would be a fascinating undertaking: two United States Airforce transport planes sat on the edge of the runway, and some RAF fighters were reported as being on patrol off to the south; a visual token of the support of western governments for this nation which was once part of the Soviet Union. From my accommodation, it would take just 4 hours, driving at moderate speed, to be in St Petersburg. The people here, most of whom are ethnic Estonians, and a quarter of whom are ethnically Russian, are watching events in the news from Ukraine and Russia with great interest: there may be lessons to learn from the Ukraine situation for the people here.

It is fascinating to see the amount of development that has taken place in this country of 1.3 million people since the end of Soviet rule. Tallinn's Old Town is a UNESCO World Heritage Site, and very beautiful: next to it is an amazingly modern city. It is interesting that this NATO and EU country, where English is spoken so well, has a legacy such as islands that its people were once not permitted to visit, heavily-polluting Soviet industrial sites, and KGB centres: these structures are now gone, but not forgotten. The mood here now is positive and forward-looking.

We have been treated extremely well by the Estonians, who have truly valued the free gift of this organ, which has become the centrepiece of an Organ Festival for this capital city. Archbishop Põder and I blessed the organ for its new work, and Brian Martin, from Bratton, gave the inaugural recital. The talented pupils of Estonia's foremost state school will be encouraged to learn the organ, and a bowl, bearing an engraving of Edington Priory Church, will become a school prize for endeavours in this field. We are hoping that links may be made between the schools in our two countries.

So what has all of this to do with God? Very simply, by making connections with our neighbours, which includes all humanity, we are learning about them, caring for them and learning to love them, and are thereby carrying out Jesus' greatest commandment: love thy neighbour. Jesus challenges us to care for all humanity—whether they are next door or a plane journey away.



Unfortunately the Annual Fun/Presentation was cancelled in June due to unpredictable weather conditions, and is now re-arranged for Saturday 5th July (please check website for info). On the International stage, the Under 13's played in the Saint Marcel International Tournament 2014 (France), being invited as representatives of West Lavington, whose twinning town St Pierre D'Autils is next to Saint Marcel. This is the second time that a team from Wiltshire has participated. The team raised all their own funds to travel and participate and the players were hosted by the twinned town association members. The tournament, won by Wolverhampton Wanderers in 2011, had teams invited from England, Germany and Morocco, as well as top teams from the Normandy / Parisian area of France. With quite a high standard of play expected from the 20 teams participating, the matches were 20 minutes in length and were 8-a-side, so not something our team was used to. On Day 1 they played 4 matches, winning 3 and losing 1 meaning they finished second in their league with a 'top 8' finish being guaranteed. On the evening of Day 1, the team were met and welcomed by the Mayor of Saint Marcel, who recognised the contribution of the British over this 'Special weekend' commemorating the Normandy Landings '70th Anniversary', as well as the importance of Sport in the development of young people in their region. Day 2 saw the quarter final against Wolverhampton, a battle of the English teams. It was a very close match which turned on a dubious penalty decision when their French U16 international fell in the box. The final score was 2-0 which perhaps flattered Wolves. This meant the team fell into a play off for 5th to 8th positions. Their next match was a 4-0 win against FC Yvelines, which meant they then went into a play-off for 5th or 6th. Unfortunately this game was to be played after a few hours, which in temperatures of 27 degrees, meant the boys were pretty tired by the time the match came around and didn't really perform to their ability going down 4-0 in the end. Overall a very creditable 6th place out of 20. A measure of the success is that Wolves only finished 4th. Many friends made the trip over, with many new French experiences for the boys: from culinary delights of snails, to the interaction



with French families and players.



A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

I have always thought that this part of Wiltshire is a good place to bring up children. We have good schools, fresh air and lots of countryside for youngsters to roam in. There is little crime or anti-social behaviour compared with other places and most people are as nice as pie. However, you

may think there comes a point, as young people grow, when there is not enough for teenagers to do in these villages or in the Devizes community area. But if you think that, you would be wrong! As part of Wiltshire Council's review of youth services, we have made a list of organisations providing services or activities for young people in the Devizes area and I am impressed by its length and breadth.

Without even going into Devizes itself, there are youth clubs in Bishops Cannings, Bromham, Market Lavington, Potterne, Rowde, Urchfont, West Lavington and Worton.

I have counted 32 various sports clubs offering athletics, bowling, boxing, canoeing, cricket, cycling, hockey, football, netball and swimming for young people. There is a fully equipped gym at the Devizes Leisure Centre and a trampoline and squash courts and more! Special activities for 5 - 14 year olds are organised in the holidays.

Energy can also be burnt off at the BMX track in West Lavington, at the indoor skate park in Devizes or at the outdoor skate park in Rowde. Devizes is also soon to get a new skate park.

There are four clubs in the area offering martial arts including Tae Kwon Do and karate.

For those with a musical ear, First Stages introduces young people aged 8 – 16 to musical theatre and puts on wonderful productions. Kennet Young Musicians allows children to participate in high-quality music making and has taken youngsters to perform in London's Royal Albert Hall and the Festival Hall. Centre Stage Academy of Dance offers classes in ballet, modern, jazz, tap, musical theatre and commercial jazz. You can see a great show on their website.

And, of course, there are the Girl Guides and the Scouts, which each offer an amazing range of activities.

MILITARY TRAINING IN JULY

July will be a very busy month on the Plain with 4 major Armoured Exercises starting with the Land Warfare Centre Armoured Division Exercise FIRST VIEW on the 2nd & 3rd of July with Challenger tanks training on the Imber and Larkhill ranges. This is followed by a Squadron from the 2nd Royal Tank Regiment with Challenger 2 tanks, 1st Battalion the Yorkshire Regiment Armoured Infantry Company in Warrior AFV's, and an armoured engineer squadron from 26 Engineer Regiment conducting low level training across all areas.

The next major exercise will be the Land Warfare Centre Ex LIONS STRIKE from the 14th to 17th July using the Imber and Larkhill dry training areas for the largest armoured exercise in the programme. The third major exercise will be Ex CROSSED CANNONS 21st to 25th July when 3 of the Royal School of Artillery courses combine for their largest training exercise of the year during which AS90 and Light Gun live firing takes place. Finally the Land Warfare Centre Armoured Division will deploy their Challenger 2 tanks across the whole Plain for Ex SABRES THRUST 28th to 31st July and will be joined by the Brigade Recce CVRTs for their final exercise BADGERS STRESS.

East Midlands University Officers Training Corps will be based in Westdown Camp for the first half of the month on their annual camp.

At the start of the monthly meeting the new committee were introduced, as was the new Chairwoman Veronyca Bates It seemed appropriate that the subject this month was gardening. The weather was glorious as members heard Marion

Dale talk about how her decision to change her career and form her own garden design company resulted in an entry into the Royal Horticultural Society spring show at Malvern in 2008. The show garden that she designed was "Aqua Libra" A Rainwater Harvesting Garden. In total some 22 other garden designs were accepted.

Marion told us that the Malvern Spring Show was a popular springboard for new and aspiring garden designers and explained the complex rules that needed to be followed. The timetable was shown. An application in mid-November complete with design, had to be followed by costing's in December, and was accepted in January. Building the garden started on 15 April for judging on 7 May, the public show being 8-11 May.


The garden was envisioned to be for a professional couple who wanted an environmentally responsible fairly low maintenance garden, including off road permeable parking. Once accepted and before the garden build sponsorship, materials and muscle power were sought. Leaflets were designed and printed and specific plants grown and sourced.

A series of slides were used to show the hard teamwork involved in the garden build, from the removal of the grass covering the designated area. The landscapers worked to a strict schedule and the garden was completed just in time. The site was cleared for the RHS judges at 3.15 pm, all the gardens were judged from 3.30 pm onwards. On her return the following morning Marion was pleased to discover that she had been awarded a silver medal. After the show had finished Marion and her team had just three days to remove the garden and replace the grass! Many questions were generated by Marion's fascinating talk, discussion continuing over refreshments.





EDINGTON CHARITY OF THE MONTH OF AUGUST - EMBRACE

Each year, more than 1 million babies die on their birth day. 98% of these deaths occur in the developing world. When infants are born prematurely, they lack the body fat necessary to regulate their own temperature. So room temperature can feel freezing cold. The hospitals have few Incubators & radiant warmers, but they are very expensive & both need constant electricity, requires specialized training & ongoing maintenance. So the hospitals used Thermocool boxes, Hot Coals, Hot Water Bottles & Light bulbs. All of these methods were dangerous and ineffective for both babies and carers.

In 2007, the Embrace Warmer started as a class project at Stanford University when a group of graduate students were challenged to design an intervention for neonatal hypothermia that cost less than 1% of the price of a state-of-the-art incubator.

The embrace warmer is durable and can be used up to 50 times, whilst being portable so

Clutter, Gardens and Repairs

This is the time of year when many of us like to spring clean, repair and de-clutter our homes and gardens. For the older and less mobile amongst us this is no mean task and finding tradespeople to undertake some of these jobs is not always straight forward.

Use local contacts – those recommended by friends and family. Ask them to provide references or evidence of previous jobs they have completed. Make sure that you have a business or home address and phone number to contact them on– not just a mobile telephone number. **Do NOT** respond to people who casually offer services at your door step. Age UK Wiltshire produces a Traders' List with contact details of trusted local traders offering services ranging from dog walking and home shopping through to builders and carpenters. Ask me for more details.

If you are de-cluttering, consider sites such as 'Freecycle', an online service through which you can give away your items. Wiltshire Council will remove large furniture items from your doorstep for a fee, which is reduced if you are on means tested benefits. There are also charities that have a free collection service, and some will pass on your small furniture items to needy families. A MODERN FAIRY STORY

THE RE-HOMING OF THE EDINGTON PRIORY HENRY-IONES ORGAN

In the stunningly beautiful medieval City of Tallinn, the capital of Estonia, there is a State Grammar School founded by the Swedish King Gustav in 1631. It is one of the oldest schools in the North Baltic area. They wished to enhance their Music School to include the

instruction of traditional classical organ music. Not having a suitable organ capable to teach and perform such music, they contacted the Parochial Parish Council of Edington to request if they could have our Henry Jones Organ, which their research had found was being replaced by a new organ.

The Edington PCC, wanted to find a worthwhile new home for their old organ that had faithfully served the village for over 110 years. The School's Headmaster and an Estonian Organ Builder visited last year's Music Festival and were delighted at the chance to give the organ a new home. They returned in the first week of January this year, assisted by several members of the village, dismanteled it and loaded it on to a lorry for Estonia. Since then their Organ Builder has been working to fit it into their Music Hall. The whole operation had to be finished for the School's Founders Day celebration, including the Organ's inaugural recital for its donation to the School from Edington on the 6th of June.

A party of 22 local residents, who had been involved with the organ, flew to Tallinn for this celebration. On the 6th the group were welcomed by the Tallin City Council with a reception in the Town Hall, by the Deputy Mayor. He presented the Rector and the



Chairman of the PC Organ Liaison Committee certificates in recognition of the donation, which was appreciated not only for the School but for the support that this facility would provide for the City and for Estonia, which had not been previously available. After the City's Reception the group attended the School's Ceremony in the 'Meder Hall' for the formal donation of the Henry Jones Organ. which was carried out by Rev Mark Jones our Parish Rector to the School's Headmaster, Hendrik Agur. In addition an engraved Glass Bowl was given by the Edington visitors for the School to use as a competitive prize. This was then followed by the Archbishop Andres Podra (Bishop of Tallin) of the Evangelistic Lutheran Church of Estonia with Our Rector jointly Dedicating the organ in its new home. This was followed by a short recital 'Toccato in D Minor by Max Regor, played by Brian Martin from Bratton.

At the finish of this initial concert of the First Tallin Organ Festival ever held, the guests all attended a Banquet in the School Dining Hall. It is hoped to establish lasting links to this attractive and beautiful corner of the Baltic with such a generous and kind folk

The well known Countryfile presenter talked about his inherited love of farming and the countryside, his interest in rare breeds and the importance of knowing where meat has come from. Members also heard from the founder of the "Send a Cow" charity that supports communities, mostly in Africa, become self sufficient; the calf in time is given to another family whilst the milk products provide food. 
This Month July 3rd we have the return of Dinah Lindon-Crotchety speaking on 'Roses, Old and New', do come along, visitors are always welcome.
