
#### **DEADLINE FOR ALL COPY & ADVERTISING 18TH OF THE MONTH**

You may be aware of the sad news that George and Dragon in Erlestoke is closed now pending a change of use to residential. There were objections from the Parish Council who successfully applied to have the Pub listed as an Asset of Village Community (AVC). This action gives interested parties 6 months to raise funds to buy the building before consideration for change of use will be considered by the Council.

The **pull out centrefold** in this month's magazine details some of the interesting history of the pub over the centuries and outlines the ideas that the steering group wish to explore. All comments are welcome, as well as offers of help and advice.

A steering group has been founded with the intention of raising money to buy the pub for use as a community establishment. There are many possibilities for community use but the first step is to get support from the villagers and surrounding areas so we can show that this is a viable proposition. The steering group in the process of applying for both capital and loan grants and is talking to the various foundations and associations who assist with specialist advice on the various methods of both raising the money and sorting the structure of how the facility would be used. The Group needs support from all the surrounding villages and are seeking some legal, financial and general advice for running such a venue — do you have the skills and would be willing to assist us? # EDINGTON PRIORY CHURCH 13TH JAZZ

FRIDAY 24TH JULY, 2015

Yes, it really is the 13th event, hard to believe but lucky for some, they say. We hope that a slight change in direction will help boost our dwindling numbers so this year we have invited a "big band" to provide the music. Some of you might already have heard them during one of their combined concerts with Steeple Rocks. There has been positive feed back. The Opus One Swing Band was formed in 2009, the dream child of Bernard Wight and Julian Scott. It presents big band music with a smaller line-up and is conducted by Bernard from the piano. Locally recruited experienced musicians and skilfully written arrangements produce a rich, full throated sound. The band comprises three trumpets, three saxes, three rhythm and two singers.

The general source of the music is from "The Great American Songbook" with an emphasis on "swing" and includes material from Count Basie, Tommy Dorsey, Duke Ellington, Glenn Miller, etc. Songs are by George and Ira Gershwin, Rodgers and Hart, Jerome Kern, Cole Porter and many more. This is not to say that more modern music is ignored. Indeed rock and jive are included in the programme but, as you would imagine, the signature tune is Tommy Dorsey's 'Opus One'. There will be two short intervals and maybe a surprise item in the car park. See you there!



#### FROM A SMALL SEED...

Now that July is here, I hope that you are able to enjoy all the beautiful plants flowering at the moment. It perhaps wasn't that long ago when a hand tapped some uninspiring brownish seeds out of their container ready for sowing – and now look at what they've become!

St. Mark's Gospel mentions seeds.

"With what can we compare the kingdom of God? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade".

I think that this means that all great achievements start from small beginnings. The author of Mark's Gospel goes on to suggest how the Kingdom of God may be built up by each and every one of us playing our part: starting off small, and by doing our best, and in small steps - building up gradually to something magnificent, something whose greatness could never even have been guessed at when starting out on that path. Although it was the preferred explanation hundreds of years ago, nowadays many scholars do not believe that establishing the Kingdom of God and growing the Church is necessarily the same thing – although there is a considerable overlap. You could, for example, not be a practising Christian and yet help to bring about part of what God wants for the world through your charity work, or through the way you attempt to reshape society by political action, for example. However, most people find it easiest to understand bringing about God's plans, his Kingdom, through participating in the work of the church, which is absolutely central to the Kingdom. Going back to the seed analogy, the church started off small, just into double figures, and now has 2,200 million members, and continues to grow. Each member is committed to making the world a better place through caring for others, practical action, raising money for charities and, of course, through prayer and worship.

In our local area, the C of E churches support nearly 40 charities; some local, some national, some international. They have a special interest in providing medicine and education in the Sudan and South Sudan, and are involved with the Station Yard, numerous local projects, are deeply involved with the local schools, and provide, through their various buildings, places for councils to meet, halls for ballet classes and other groups, rehearsal venues e.g. for the Bratton Silver Band, and for playgroups and pre-schools to meet.



#### JULY - MOTOR NEURONE DISEASE ASSOCIATION.

Motor neurone disease (MND) is a progressive disease that attacks the motor neurones, or nerves, in the brain and spinal cord. This means messages gradually stop reaching muscles, which leads to weakness and wasting.MND can affect how you walk, talk, eat, drink and breathe. Although there is currently no cure for MND, symptoms can be managed to help you achieve the best possible



quality of life.MND is a progressive neurodegenerative disease that attacks the upper and ower motor neurones. The muscles first affected tend to be those in the hands, feet and mouth, dependent on which type of the disease you are diagnosed with. The effects of MND can vary enormously from person to person, from the presenting symptoms, and the rate and pattern of the disease progression, to the length of survival time after diagnosis. In recent years there is evidence to suggest the incidence of Motor Neurone Disease (MND) is increasing. This could possibly be due to more accurate diagnostic testing. Also, as people are generally living for longer, the incidence of a disease more common in older people will continue to increase. Motor Neurone Disease association improve care and support for people with MND, their families and carers. They fund and promote research that leads to new understanding and treatments, and brings them closer to a cure for MND.

#### AUGUST - TEARFUND

This year is the 60th Edington Music Festival, so it's going to be quite special. Over these past 60 years 'our' Festival has grown to become one of the oldest annual festivals of church music in the world, with a reputation which spans the globe.

#### DONATIONS TO ENRICH OUR PROVISION

We were delighted to receive a very generous donation of £750 from the Edington Station Yard Ltd this year, with a commitment for a similar sum in the next two years, to support music in our school. Until recently, Government funding has

been available to support projects such as instrument tuition with a music specialist for every Year 3 child, but now that this funding has been withdrawn, we are going to have to find other sources of income to continue with our programme of enrichment. We were, therefore, extremely grateful when the Board of Edington Station Yard Ltd approached us with this offer of funding – their generosity will ensure that the Year 3 programme can continue. We are most fortunate to be part of such a strong and supportive community.

#### CHANGES TO EDUCATION

We are preparing for a change of curriculum, assessment and inspection regimes in line with the Government's new protocols. From next year, the whole assessment process will be completely new, with different criteria (as yet not defined) for outstanding performance and with levels now a thing of the past. It is not clear yet how the new system will work but we know that our children will continue to achieve in the outstanding way in which they always do – our teachers are outstanding, our children are committed and aspirational and our families are supportive and engaged.

#### SUMMER TERM FUN

This term is one of our favourites, with so many different things happening – all our children have had a trip to American museum in Bath, to support our topic on "The Quiltmaker's Gift" – this was a really interesting trip with children learning about Native Americans, European settlers and the culture of the early Americas.

Everyone has also had a workshop on renewable energy and a trip to the Solar Farm in Devizes as the result of a generous donation of time, buses, specialist input and resources by Gaiger Bros Ltd. This project has enriched the work we do on helping children to understand their role as "Stewards of Our World" - our children are going to have to deal with climate change and need to have a solid understanding of the issues involved. We are very grateful to the Gaigers for their support with this work.

Coming up, we also have several sports events, including sports day (always hotly contested in our school!), parties, art exhibitions, music concerts, a French concert, events to which parents are invited, Leavers' celebrations, a Eucharist with the Bishop presiding, and, of course, lots of outdoor activities and picnics to make best use of this wonderful summer weather.

In one of my recent Messages, I suggested that the General Election could be seen as an expression of the liberty of the people that can be linked back to the Magna Carta, signed 800 years ago.

A mere two hundred years ago, another event curtailed the career of a despotic ruler of the time and that too has had implications that resonate today. I refer, of course, to the Battle of Waterloo.

In the years before Waterloo, Napoleon had sought to extend his hegemony across the whole of Europe. Military power was part of it but Napoleon had also sought to diminish the prosperity and growth of his rival, Great Britain, by the imposition of a large-scale embargo against British trade. This policy was known as the Continental System and it was, in part, successful. British trade dropped considerably, but the law of unintended consequences applied and Marseille, Bordeaux and La Rochelle also suffered from the loss of trade. Across the continent, food prices rose and the resentment of client states against Napoleon increased. Russia's refusal to join the Continental System led eventually to the invasion of Russia in 1812 and Napoleon's defeat there marked the beginning of his downfall.

Indeed, the support of other nations was vital to Wellington's success at Waterloo. His army was described as a Coalition and included Dutch and Belgian troops and soldiers from various German states as well. The battle was eventually won only after the intervention of the Prussians under Blucher.

I am not sure if we can draw any lessons from this. The power of free trade? The need for alliances? The fact that what seems like a good idea at the time can have unintended consequences?

I can't help noticing that the Waterloo battlefield is very near to Brussels and, in a year or two's time, the liberty of the British people will again be expressed in the EU Referendum. It will be interesting to see if that too becomes a landmark in history.



# NEWS FROM YOUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR JERRY WICKHAM

There has been quite a busy time on planning matters in both Edington and Coulston of late.

In Edington, there was an outline application for 9 houses, at land adjacent to Little Court Lane. In a packed Parish Council meeting, we heard from both representatives from the developer as well as local residents, some for but many against the proposal. At the conclusion, the Parish Council considered this and entered their objections. I subsequently then asked for the matter to be heard before a planning committee, if the Wiltshire planning officer was minded to approve the application, since I was aware of the real feeling in the village. I was also of the belief that this application was contrary to the relatively new Wiltshire Core Strategy. We now know that the developer has decided to withdraw this application.

Meanwhile in Coulston, notice was given of an intention to convert some stables into a dwelling in New Road. This type of application arises from new legislation which in part extends permitted development rights. When faced with this notification, planners have to demonstrate in effect why this should not go ahead. Following both a Parish Council meeting and then another packed public meeting, a number of representations were made, which were in contrast to some the statements in the original application. Wiltshire Council have now determined this entire application and have refused it. Of course it follows that there is a right of appeal, so it is a question of seeing what emerges.

It was also a pleasure to attend and open the village fete at Edington which seemed a very well supported event.

Finally, at the recent Area Board, I was very pleased to support some additional funding for the Edington Ringing centre, at Edington Priory, which teaches bell ringing. These sessions are well used by all age groups.







#### **Falls Awareness**

There are many things that contribute towards the risk of falling either in the home or out and about, and there are a number of steps we can take to help reduce the likelihood of having a fall. Here are just a few:

- Check for hazards such as a loose carpets or rugs, clutter or cables. Are the stairs well lit with suitable rails?
- Much as we love our pets, they can be a trip hazard. A bell on the collar can help!
- Have your eyes and hearing checked regularly.
- Manage your medicines some medication can cause dizziness or affect balance.
- Tackle the fear of falling if you have had a fall, or don't feel confident to move about, there are exercise classes available locally which can help.
- Consider having a personal alarm (Lifeline) which you can use in the event of a fall to get help quickly. Some providers can now also supply fall detectors.

If you have been thinking about joining us, do come along on the 14th or contact Helen our president on the number above.





Would villagers be mindful of parking to allow access for farm vehicles as hay making and shortly harvest mean an increase in large farm machinery using our narrow lanes.

A reminder to dog owners to pick up after your dogs both on the footpaths and in the fields as dog faeces can be hazardous to farm animals. The Parish Council would be grateful if villagers could help prevent dogs straying onto the playing field, this is a legal requirement as well as putting children at risk.

We were entertained and informed in equal measure by Charlotte Popescu on "Keeping hens in the garden". This was a new topic for us although there are hen-keepers among our members, some "may-be's" and some "no-thank-you's". All of us learned something new from a real expert who went from keeping 4 to 50 free range hens and now writes popular books and articles on the rewards (and some trials) of keeping hens....and cockerels.

There are now three quarters of a million hen-keepers in the U.K who love the charm of these creatures and enjoy the wonderful fresh eggs they provide. We discovered hens have good eyesight, and are sociable; love grass, perching, preening and dustbaths, need shelter from the wind and rain and enjoy sunbathing.

We saw a lovely slideshow of many of the breeds available including larger pure breeds such as Rhode Island Reds, Marans, Orpingtons and Leghorns and the smaller pure breeds of bantams (including the Araucana which lays a lovely blue egg). We learnt about the hybrids developed to breed all year and the hardy garden-bred crossbreeds. We looked at the recovering ex-battery hens and also the role of the cockerel who as well as fertilizing the eggs, keeps alert for buzzards and breaks up hen-fights!


We finished by looking at some general care tips including food shelter and feeding options. We heard about predators – badgers, foxes, buzzards and dogs and discovered that although hens may eat your vegetables if they are not protected, they will also eat your slugs and snails. Hurrah for hens! We ended the evening by buying some multicoloured freshly laid eggs and signed books on both hen-keeping and cookery – another of Charlottes area of expertise.






#### "THE VIEW FROM THE WINGS"

Mr Brian Freeland entertained us with a very interesting and amusing talk about all aspects of theatre. Following a visit to the Old Vic Theatre in Bristol, where the young Peter O'Toole was performing, Mr Freeland decided he wanted to work in the theatre. He trained in various theatres in the fields of management, lighting design and as theatre manager as well as director. He has now retired from the theatre itself but is still writing scripts as well as giving talks on his experiences and directing amateur dramatics. Mr Freeland began his career while the Crazy Gang was still performing and can recall when Tommy Trinder was the presenter of Sunday Night at the London Palladium before Bruce Forsyth took over. He also worked in pantomimes and remembers Harry Secombe performing. He certainly had us all laughing with anecdotes and stories of the actors he has worked with as well as the various "digs" the actors stayed in and the idiocyncracies of the landladies. He recalled working at Butlin's theatre where they would not allow any risqué jokes or double entendres where one amateur holidaymaker's jokes were a bit close to the knuckle and the curtain brought down on him. Mr Freeland told us that in his opinion the hardest workers in the theatre were the ballet dancers, who rehearsed the next ballet in the morning, rehearsed their current one in the afternoon and performed in the evening. Then by way of relaxation would go to a disco. Freeland has also directed opera in Scotland and Ireland. In Wexford, a slope had been built on the stage but covered in formica which was slippery. It was discovered that covering it in lemon juice made it safe but on the first night somebody cleaned it and the opening singer slid down the slope, still singing, followed by the second singer both narrowly missing the orchestra pit. They were then followed by the chorus with the audience convulsed with laughter. Mr Freeland said that he has worked all over the world even China during Chairman Mao's time when the Peking and Shanghai ballet dancers all wore the blue boiler suits, there were no cars anywhere and one child was terrified by seeing western people. Mr Freeland spoke of George Bernard Shaw, whom he greatly admired for his prodigous output as well as the two thousand lectures he gave and the quarter of a million postcards and letters he wrote. He ended by saying he had worked with Edith Evans, Sybil Thorndyke, Laurence Olivier, John Guilguid to name but a few. There followed some questions and answers and refreshments which were needed after so much laughter. Next month our speaker will be John Clark talking about Underwater Treasure Hunting. 

# Background so far...

A small committee of Erlestoke villagers is seeking to form a community co-operative to purchase the freehold of the George and Dragon Inn.

The current owners have applied to convert the building to residential and it is now closed. However Wiltshire Council have granted the status of Asset of Community Value (ACV) to the Pub to provide a breathing space for the community to buy the Pub. The freehold Pub, built as a coaching inn in the 17ct, is Grade 2 listed. It is in a conservation area in a high profile and attractive location, on a busy road and is currently up for sale at a guide price of £320,000.

It includes a separate accommodation block containing 5 en suite letting rooms and the owners claim to have spent in excess of £100k making improvements.

The George and Dragon can return to being a focus in our community, as a meeting place for visitors, serving freshly prepared food and put. the heart back in the community by offering a space for social and cultural activities with open doors all day.

The initial proposition is for the community to buy the bricks and mortar through a co-operative and either find a tenant or put a manager in. However all options at this early stage are under consideration.

Funding will come from co-operative members, asset backed loans and support grants. To become members of the co-operative individuals or corporates are asked to invest between £250 and £20,000. Each member of the co-operative will have an equal say in how the Pub is managed irrespective of their shareholding following the co-operative principle of 'One Member,' One Vote!

The income will initially cover any interest payments and building maintenance with any surplus available to distribute to members

through a dividend.

There is a great deal of support for the purchase of community assets, such as Pubs and we are already in contact with helpful organisations seeking service and capital grants as well as loans.

We are keen to gauge the level of interest from the community and will be developing the legal structure required. This will be followed by a more detailed prospectus and business plan but currently a verbal pledge of support is all that is required.

This is a great opportunity and it is important to recognise that a healthy well run community. Pub will add significant value to our community, village and houses.

# Community and friends of Erlestoke

An important part of the village's history is under threat

For over 300 years our Pub, The George and Dragon, has been serving beer and food to the local labourers, foresters, villagers and passing travellers as well as providing stabling for the local work horses.

In 1827 Mr John J Hopkins took over the tenancy of The George, as it was then called, and ran it until 1855 when he sold the stock for  $\pm 412.14.2$  to the new Publican Jonathon Shore.

160 years later one of our village community, a direct descendent of Jonathon Shore, has had to watch with dismay as the George and Dragon has struggled to survive. It has been beset by the challenges facing rural Pubs in small communities and now, as is so common, faces the ignominious fate of becoming a private residence.

# We should not be losing our Pub

The Parish Council and members of the local community believe that the Pub can be commercially viable, if run properly. With that in mind we are putting forward a proposal which, with support and help, could enable the community to buy the Pub from the current owners and place it back at the heart of our community and village – where it belongs.

As times have changed Pubs have had to adapt to survive and we are not under any illusions that the traditional model for the George,

followed over the last 300 years will be enough. We firmly believe that the business is not only commercially viable, but can also serve as a community asset. It can help replace our lost village hall, shop and Post Office, as well as provide a location for some of the important activities that our recent survey highlighted were needed in the village. And of course we shouldn't forget that it adds value to our village and our homes.
