



EDINGTON PRIORY CHURCH 13TH JAZZ

Yes, it really is the 13th event, hard to believe but lucky for some, they say. We hope that a slight change in direction will help boost our dwindling numbers so this year we have invited a "big band" to provide the music. Some of you might already have heard them during one of their combined concerts with Steeple Bells. There has been positive feed back. The Opus One Swing Band was formed in 2009, the dream child of Bernard Wight and Julian Scott. It presents big band music with a smaller line-up and is conducted by Bernard from the piano. Locally recruited experienced musicians and skilfully written arrangements produce a rich, full throated sound. The band comprises three trumpets, three saxes, three rhythm and two singers.

The general source of the music is from "The Great American Songbook" with an emphasis on "swing" and includes material from Count Basie, Tommy Dorsey, Duke Ellington, Glenn Miller, etc. Songs are by George and Ira Gershwin, Rodgers and Hart, Jerome Kern, Cole Porter and many more. This is not to say that more modern music is ignored. Indeed rock and jive are included in the programme but, as you would imagine, the signature tune is Tommy Dorsey's "Opus One". 

MAGNA CARTA

In my recent visits to schools, I have seen quite a lot of work already relating to the 800th anniversary of the Magna Carta, and many other schools have lots in store for their pupils in the month of June. As many of you know, Salisbury Cathedral has arguably the finest of the four copies of this ancient charter, and there are many, many events, ranging from children's' activities and cream teas, through to talks by eminent historians and legal experts detailing the importance of this document. Please see their website for details. But what is the Magna Carta? The Magna Carta is short for the *Magna Carta Libertatum*, which is Latin for the *Great Charter of the Liberties* — but this is not its original name. The original document, the *Articles of the Barons* was drafted by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Stephen Langton, as an attempt to avoid all-out war between King John and his rebellious barons.

As a result of careful listening to the demands of both sides, and ten days' negotiation between them, Langton's charter was signed at Runnymede, halfway between the King's fortress at Windsor and the rebel encampment at Staines. Four days later, the rebels renewed their oaths of loyalty to their king, and four copies were made, one going to Salisbury Cathedral. The Articles were renamed a few years later as the Magna Carta Libertatum, and reissued. The document promised the protection of church rights, protection from illegal imprisonment, access to swift justice, and, most importantly for the barons, limitations on taxation and other feudal payments to the Crown - with certain forms of feudal taxation requiring baronial consent. The barons owed the crown a lot of money, and when the Charter talked about the 'rights of free men', they were really talking about themselves more than serfs and others – but it was a starting point on the road to constitutional and legal reform. The king was coerced into signing the document, and Pope Innocent III declared it null and void, and indeed excommunicated Archbishop Langton for his role in preparing it, but the document has since June 1215 been reissued a number of times, and has become a symbol of justice for many (as long as you don't look at the actual content too deeply!). From a Christian point of view, we see the efforts of Innocent III trying to uphold an anointed king against coercion, the barons' natural demands for justice, and Langton's efforts to make peace. After much time and tribulation, a solution was found, which we continue to celebrate today. When I was much younger, there seemed no prospect for peace in Northern Ireland. No hope of normal relations between Cuba and the U.S.: no end to Apartheid. The list of world problems goes on and on. Eventually though, prayers are answered, and peace does reigns supreme.

Elefriends is a supportive online community where you can be yourself. They all know what it's like to struggle sometimes, but now there's a safe place to listen, share and be heard.







THE FOUR VILLAGES LINK, a registered charity scheme, is your local community volunteer support group that can provide you with assistance should you need it.

The FVL (part of a county wide independent scheme of 45 similar organisations) provides assistance to people across the four villages. In 2014 our 50 strong volunteer base gave over 1000 hours of their time and undertook journeys totalling over 7000 miles, the majority

of which were to and from medical appointments at our local hospitals. It is purely down to the continued commitment of our amazing group of volunteers that we are able to offer such an important service to our community.

These days with the decline in locally funded services we can help fill the gap by providing transport to and from appointments as well as help with a variety of practical tasks. We are also able to offer aid with small practical household jobs and we even have a wheelchair that can be loaned out on a short term basis.

If you would like help just call us on and one of our duty coordinators will log your request and find a volunteer to help you. All calls are charged at mobile rates. Responding to requests can be demanding so it really helps to receive plenty of notice when being asked to organise assistance, ideally not less than 48 hours in advance.

The result is very filling and makes a good breakfast. If eaten 3 times a week it will give all the vitamins and minerals normally required.







New Children

It was wonderful to meet the families of the children who will be starting with us in the Foundation Stage in September. As we welcome these new members to our school family, we are aware that re-

lationships started now are likely to last until the end of primary school and probably well beyond. Not only are these families part of our Holy Trinity school community as important partners in their child's education, but many families have formed lifelong friendships with each other through their involvement in school.

Residential Trips The children in Key Stage 2 all have the opportunity to go on residential trips each year. Children in Years 5 and 6 went to the Forest of Dean and children in Years 3 and 4 went to Oxenwood. They take part in lots of adventure activities whilst on these trips – canoeing, caving, archery, climbing, biking and much more. But, even more importantly, they learn courage, resilience, team work, independence and joy in testing themselves to the limit. We are very grateful to our extraordinary team of teachers who take responsibility for so many children, for 24 hours a day, to allow them to have these wonderful experiences. It is a heavy duty of care that the teachers accept in order to enrich the lives of the children they teach in this way.

SATS Our Year 6 children wrote the statutory Key Stage 2 assessments in May – in Reading, Writing, Maths, and Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar. These are the tests that the government uses to rank schools, and in which our children do so well that we are

judged to be in the top few percent of the country. In order to prove our probity in administering these tests, we invited heads of department from Lavington School to come and observe us as we ran the tests. This is a comment from the Head of English:

"I was really impressed with the maturity of the students - who settled beautifully to complete their test - and the high standards with which you, and the school, have upheld the responsibilities of conducting fair and accurate tests." As ever, we are very proud of our children, who do so well academically but, more importantly, we are proud that they live out the school values of courage, compassion, aspiration and joy in all that they do.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE

Well, you've had your chance to participate in democracy. Whether or not you voted and whether or not the result was what you wanted, the die is cast and we have a government selected by the people in accordance with the rules of our system.

In the Devizes constituency, the turnout was over 71%, which is the highest since the election of 1992, nearly a quarter of a century ago. If a high participation rate is a good thing, then perhaps the health of our democracy is improving.

Another statistic of interest is that nearly 58% of the voters in the Devizes constituency supported the winning candidate, which is the highest proportion since 1935.

The democratic process, by definition, is competitive. In some ways it can also be confrontational but the same can be said of the legal process (criminally accused vs prosecutor, civil litigant vs defender) and to some degree, the planning process (applicant vs objectors). It is a reflection on civilisation if these contests are conducted without rancour.

As far as I could tell, the interchange in this area between the protagonists in the General Election was almost unfailingly polite, which I think reflects well on our community and our society. Having selected our representatives, we may, from time to time, need access to them so that they can deal with our personal issues. In the case of our MP, we can write or seek a personal meeting at one of the regular surgeries.

At county level, there are other opportunities to take an active part in the process of government. Full Council meetings, Cabinet meetings and most committee meetings are open to the public, who can usually speak if they wish. Locally, there is easy access to elected members (including me) through the Area Board, which meets every two months.

The next meeting of the Devizes Area Board is on Monday, 27th July. Doors open at 6.00pm and the proceeding start at 6.30pm and usually go on until 8.30pm. It's too soon for me to confirm the location or the agenda but there are normally a number of topics of interest. Details will be published on http://devizes.ourcommunitymatters.org.uk/ and on the Wiltshire Council website. I look forward to seeing you at the next Area Board.



Margo Mulligan-Scaife, first-footed her way in to St Moritz with a pair of tissue paper thin blue leather gloves gifted by her mother 50 years ago.

In the train station car park, sitting on a bench, she marked landfall in this jet-set capital of Europe by reading her favourite author, Irish novelist James Joyce.

From her bag she produced Dubliners, a midget edition of short stories by this giant of early 20th century literature, and read Eveline, one from the collection that launched his challenging career in 1914.

Her audience included two fellow travellers on a Rail Discoveries holiday to Italy's Lake Como, experiencing a fantastic day trip on the panoramic Bernina Express, a train officially listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site on The Move; snaking through 55 tunnels, crossing 196 bridges as it cork-screws its way 7,000ft to peaks still heavy with snow in May.

Margo, in a crystal-clear County Wicklow voice that would lighten any darkness from the lectern, was, if you like, planting her own flag for Ireland. Neil Armstrong did it on the moon. Explorers reaching the Pole, too. She did it with the spoken word.

Her words drifted away on the breeze. But the memory lingers. A story to be repeated whenever great, memorable holiday moments are recalled in the future.

The blue gloves? Well, the tour manager, a gangly 6ft 6in tall man whose white straw hat made its own statement, warned it would be very cold, however the ever present sun tried to persuade otherwise. Be prepared to wrap up, he said.

In fact, his advice — and Margo's gloves, as sublime and pristine as they were when she was first handed them in 1964 — turned out to be a precaution not a prerequisite.

The beautiful sunny weather — highlighting this time-piece of Swiss luxury and chic like Margo's reading, flick-switched an amazing day to an unforgettable one. Whether it would have been quite the same had she taken the author's banned Ulysses from her handbag, a controversial blockbuster that took him six years to write and devotees claim almost as long to read, is a different story.

This year started very quiet compared to recent years but changed dramatically as the year progressed. Cllr Simon West proved an active councillor attending meetings with the Prison staff and MOD and starting the project to bring back the Erlestoke Gates to their rightful home in Erlestoke. Cllr West advised that when the Ministry of Defence moved out of Erlestoke House, now Erlestoke Prison, they removed the main gates and took them with them. Cllr West has found them at Camberley training centre.

Sadly Simon has had to step down because his son has had a terrible accident. We offer Simon and his family all the help and support available that we can give from the village.

The B3098 continues to be an issue in Erlestoke. We are still working on a safe crossing for school children at the bus stop. A number of things have been done including speed recording using the police metro count system. We are now going back to the Unity Council to revisit the dangers of crossing the road.

Erlestoke works on a tight budget and the precept only just covers the expenses of running the village. Although we are in a period of government austerity cutbacks we are at the tail end of financial balancing and the bills do not reduce. This year we decided on a small increase to the precept. A rise of £6.18 per year per band D house i.e. 12p per week.

We were very pleased to accept the application for the vacant councillor post from Justin Hunt-Davis of Brounckers Court Farm. Justin brings a wealth of knowledge from his work with government meetings and procedures and has already proved invaluable with our current issues.

We are now working closely with Sarah Hanks, (Community Co-ordinator) in our area. Sarah sorted the blocked drains through the village and looks after the general upkeep of the village. We still have a long term blocked drain issue opposite Beech House, after heavy rain this can block and will be the source of the blocked drains issue in the village. The drain now requires rebuilding with concrete blocks as it is also periodically hit be traffic when two large vehicles are inching past one another in a traffic jam.

During the summer months we seem to be going through a period of Raves from Stoke Hill Farm to Coulston. The Raves take place on weekends when the Police are deployed in the towns and cities. The edge of the plain where these activities take place is almost deemed as no man's land and covered by Land Wardens not the Police. Unfortunately we hear that the Land Wardens numbers have been reduced making the situation worse.

Ironically we still are unable to get a response from the SSE on the over capacity issue of the Sub Station. It seems this is just not a priority any more. The village has experienced power cuts during the year and we are keen to get this Sub Station upgraded.

This year we have decided to go ahead with the Neighbourhood Plan for Erlestoke. The Neighbourhood Plan must relate to the Wiltshire County Core Strategy. Very briefly the Wiltshire Core Strategy states the location of new buildings sites, road infrastructure, social and shopping facilities amongst any development and changes that might be required in each

town in Wiltshire. Without the Erlestoke Neighbourhood Plan builders and developers will use the Wiltshire Core Strategy for villages as an indication where to develop. With the Neighbourhood Plan Erlestoke can identify and control where any development can take place.

In January this year the Parish Council received an application to convert the George & Dragon Pub into a residential property. We only had a few weeks to respond and decided we must take this issue directly to the residents of Erlestoke. In fact the consultants who generated the report for the George & Dragon used the Wiltshire Core Strategy as part of their justification for converting the pub to residential as this type of work is covered in the Wiltshire Core Strategy. We called for an Extra-Ordinary Parish Council meeting Held in the Parish Church Wednesday 11th February 2015 at 7.15pm. The agenda was to discuss the application and the possibility of considering applying for a community asset on the building.

The meeting was well attended with 39 people and an open and frank discussion took place regarding the present use of the pub and the future of the building. People were given the opportunity to voice their concerns on both the issue of the change of use to residential and the possibility of applying for listing as an asset of community value.

After lengthy discussion at the next Parish Council meeting, the Parish Council decided to advise Wiltshire Council of the following objection:

"The Parish Council objects to the change to residential due to the lack of facilities in the village and the Parish Council believe the pub is an asset the village requires. We also decided to apply for a community Asset order on the pub to explore the opportunities for the village."

Since the meeting the Parish Council has done a study with a question and answer proforma to gain more information from the residents and possibly a way forward.

The George and Dragon pub and Asset of Community Value Application.






NEWS FROM YOUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR JERRY WICKHAM

After the longest general election campaign in memory we now have the most 'surprising' result in 25 years and one which the polls had absolutely wrong but we are now at least settled with a Westminster government for the next five years. This will produce its own challenges for local government and we are still uncertain of the detail. However, there is one aspect that is certain and that is that there will be less money available for local government. Therefore, those of us who work in County Hall will have to do more with less and do it more efficiently. This will involve new ways of working but also the restructuring of a number of valued services for which we have no statutory responsibility.

Whilst driving around the area and as part of my responsibilities associated with waste and recycling, I often see recycling bins for plastic and cardboard (blue) with missing lids. We are aware that there have been some issues with these but if you are in this position, the lid can be replaced by Wiltshire Council free of charge. Basically, if the contents are left open to the elements, the cardboard becomes wet and soggy and cannot be recycled. If you have a damaged lid, please make contact by email customerservicescentral@wiltshire.gov.uk or telephone 0300 4560 102 and arrangements will be made to repair this. Likewise, if you still want to sign up for your green bin to be collected, there is now a charge of £40 per year. This can be completed by accessing www.wiltshire.gov.uk/gardenwaste or telephoning the number above.

Finally, we all are aware of the state of the B3098. Indeed I have mentioned it regularly in these articles and receive regular comment from residents. I was advised that this was due to take place this summer. However, recently I have been advised that this has been significantly delayed. Accordingly, I am escalating this since this is unacceptable due to the state of the surface in certain locations and the inherent danger. 



We listened to Vera Tottingham talk about the visit she and five other members made to the NFWI Centenary Celebrations at the Wellington Academy, Tidworth. There were over 350 ladies present who were entertained during the morning with demonstrations on besom broom making and coppicing, clematis care, candle making and wood turning.





U3A REPORT


THE UNIVERSITY OF THE THIRD AGE







