

### How to get to Wiltshire

#### **By Coach**

There are regular long-distance coach services from many parts of England to Chippenham, Marlborough, Salisbury, Swindon and other Wiltshire towns

#### By Rail

Fast and regular services from London (Paddington) to Bath and Bristol serve Swindon (55 mins) and Chippenham (70 mins) in the north of Wiltshire, and Great Bedwyn (90 mins) – with connecting bus services available to Marlborough. From London (Waterloo), the trains stop at Salisbury (85 mins) and Tisbury (103 mins). The Bristol-Weymouth and Southampton lines call at Bradford on Avon, Trowbridge, Westbury, Warminster and Salisbury for visitors from the Midlands and the North. Services run from London to Warminster, Trowbridge, and Bradford on Avon with Eurostar connections from St Pancras station in London. ## By Road

North Wiltshire is conveniently accessible from London or Heathrow Airport by using the M4. The M3 connects London to the A30 and A303 roads, which serve the south of Wiltshire. From the Midlands and the North, the best route is by the M5 to the outskirts of Bristol and then into Wiltshire by the M4, A4 or A36.

## By Sea

From the Continent, car ferries operate from Hook of Holland, Cherbourg, Caen, Le Havre, St. Malo and Bilbao to either Harwich, Portsmouth, Plymouth, Southampton or Poole, all of which are within one to three hours' drive from Wiltshire.

## Wiltsbire welcomes you

#### ...following in the footsteps of history

This beautiful land of rolling hills, peaceful wooded river valleys and scenic villages really captures the essence of rural England. Much of the county is designated as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and is particularly suited to getting about on foot. Wiltshire is famous for white horses cut into the turf of chalk hillsides and to help you really appreciate the magic and mystery of these 8 hill figures and the land which they occupy, we have created this long distance walking trail.

The trail can be enjoyed as a 90 mile hike over 6 or 7 days or as a series of shorter walks exploring some of the most interesting and exciting landscapes in southern England. You will pass prehistoric sites such as Avebury, walk sections of the Ridgeway (said to be Europe's oldest road), visit the medieval town of Devizes and the market town of Marlborough, stroll through Wiltshire's largest village and walk sections of the famous Kennet and Avon Canal. And, of course, you will see Wiltshire's 8 white horses - we have especially chosen the route so that you will approach the horses from the best possible vantage points.

The route is designed to be walked in an anti-clockwise direction, starting and finishing at Westbury (sometimes known as Bratton) White Horse. However, the route can be picked up at any point along the trail. The whole route has been way-marked for ease of following, with the symbol shown below. We have also installed interpretation boards at each of the white horses to give you further information along the way.

Inside this pack, you will find:

- 8 pull out sections with route instructions to guide you from horse to horse
- The locations of places to stay, refreshment stops, village shops and attractions
- Historical information about each of the horses.

We hope that you enjoy this spectacular route through one of the most unspoilt and charming counties in England. If you have any comments about this pack, the interpretation boards, the waymarks or the route itself, please complete the questionnaire enclosed.
