Somerville College Choir is young by Oxford standards, and, like the College's founders, non-denominational. Hence their programming is eclectic and open, balancing Anglican choral works with secular music from an inclusive range of composers. They have toured and recorded extensively, and are very highly regarded. Will was formerly a member of the vocal ensemble Stile Antico, and is now much in demand as a choral conductor.
